WORD OF THE PRESIDENT

2024 was a year of transition for the Caritas Ukraine network. During the first two years of the full-scale war, we focused our efforts on responding to the emerging situation, developing our response, but keeping our main focus on the unprecedented scale of immediate needs due to the full-scale invasion.

In 2024, we began a deeper conversation about longer-term development and planning, about how best to build our structures and partnerships to fulfill our mission in the next three challenging years effectively. In the process of discussions, we identified three key principles – a "compass" to lead us as we work towards vision of development in the near future:



- **1. Improvement.** Finding the best and most innovative way to implement the planned
- 2. Human-centeredness. Nurturing, restoring, and revealing human dignity
- **3.** Cooperation and networking. Joint actions, building connections, and strengthening partnerships

These have been identified as our guiding principles, our filter for all our activities, for the next three years. Our aim is that they permeate all our work and outreach, as well as the culture of our teamwork.

In 2024, these principles were expressed in strengthened initiatives, such as innovative approaches in projects that restore livelihoods, or in our joint efforts to design a formation program for the entire network. In 2024, the first steps were also taken to improve our organizational systems and strengthen our networking outside Caritas, namely, participation in various Ukrainian and international platforms (e.g., Alliance of Ukrainian CSOs, NGO Platform). A particular achievement in the network was participation in pilot innovative social services introduced by the Ministry of Social Policy, such as "Resilience Centers", and development of Medical Centers.

In 2025, we will continue to work towards maintaining our capacity to respond quickly to crises and stabilize those affected by the war. Together with local communities, state institutions, and other civil society organizations (both Ukrainian and international), we will continue to search for sustainable solutions to the social challenges created by the war, both at the individual and community levels. Strengthening social cohesion and building resilience remain cross-cutting issues for our activities and initiatives. Our partnerships are vital in this effort. In light of the challenges ahead, our membership in the Caritas confederation is a place of strength for us, because it is also a place of encounter. Through encounters, we share experiences and knowledge and build practical solidarity. This important part of our Caritas "DNA" is uniquely designed to grow our strength, keep us centered and focused on compassion and professionalism, allowing us to serve those in need best.



In 2024, Caritas' greatest strength was the power of collaboration and networking. We operate as one network — global in spirit, local in presence standing alongside people in their communities.


The sustainability of our organisation is founded on an identity that combines three essential components: values, religious faith, and the nurturing of relationships.

On flexibility and adaptation in times of crisis

2024 taught us to be flexible and to adapt to new challenges. We focused on identifying internal funding reserves and optimising our assistance processes. We managed to build a coherent chain of support for people on the move: from evacuation, through transit centres, to temporary yet more stable accommodation.

We paid particular attention to stabilising people in crisis.

In 2025, we aim to facilitate the formation of a new architecture for coordinating humanitarian assistance in Ukraine, engaging Ukrainian and international organisations, the government, and local authorities.

On restoring and supporting people

The stability of Caritas Ukraine in these turbulent times rests on two pillars — our people and the reliable support of our partners.

We help local organisations grow, foster community development and build a strong network of partners in the social and humanitarian spheres.

What helps to recover and stay the course: "I try not to lose heart and to support others. My family, friends and favourite activities keep me going: hiking, football and face-to-face conversation. Five of my friends have joined the Armed Forces (one, unfortunately, was killed). Yet we stay in touch, and that gives me strength. A healthy atmosphere in the team is also essential — it keeps you going when times are hard."



Results of Work in 2024. General Overview

In response to the crisis caused by Russia's fullscale invasion of Ukraine in 2022, Caritas Ukraine scaled up its work in all areas of critical assistance.

- 3.6 million beneficiaries have been covered since February 24, 2022 (approx. 498,000 in 2024).
- 6.8 million services have been provided since • February 24, 2022 (approx. 1.6 million in 2024).

We combine humanitarian response and social protection and continue to advocate for reform of Ukraine's social services system.

Strengthening the Organisational Capacity of the Network

In 2024, our team focused on increasing the capacity and resilience of the network of organisations.


• An Integration Program for the network's employees was developed.

This program is designed to familiarise new employees with Caritas' history, identity, policies, procedures, and the Caritas Internationalis Management Standards (CIMS).

733 employees completed the program in 2024 (since April 2022, approx. 2,100 participants from across the network have passed it),

• A performance management and staff development system was implemented to improve work processes and relationships within the team.

16 local organisations have implemented this system.

Priorities for 2025

In 2025, the priority in humanitarian protection and counselling will be to expand services for preventing gender-based violence, introduce specialised case management for persons with disabilities, veterans, and their families, and strengthen the inclusiveness and accessibility of all forms of assistance.

Department of Social Programs

Strengthening expert capacity and expanding service delivery.

Key achievements in 2024:

10 medical centres opened, nine of which were supported by Cordaid.

Implementation of a home care service using telemedicine in partnership with Caritas Italy.

Opening of the first inpatient hospice in Voynyliv, run by Caritas Ivano-Frankivsk.

Training for 30 certified network trainers in cooperation with the University of Education Management and the Catholic University of Freiburg.

Development of the proprietary methodology «The Superhero's Way» — a psychosocial support program for children who have experienced traumatic war events. The methodology is already being implemented in educational institutions i in Ukraine and Romania, and will be rolled out in Poland in 2025.

Creating an online course on combating human trafficking on the Prometheus platform to raise public awareness of exploitation risks and self-protection measures.

Priorities for 2025

In 2025, the priorities will be sustaining social services, supporting care centres, shelters for elderly IDPs, children's spaces, and psychosocial rehabilitation camps. International cooperation in safe migration, combating human trafficking, and coordination through the Ukraine Refugee Response Learning Platform will continue.





Department of Humanitarian Aid Distribution

Key achievements in 2024

Our mission is to respond to urgent needs and create long-term solutions. In 2024 our teams:

- restored access to water in affected communities;
- developed and implemented a strategy for a systematic approach to providing IDPs with social housing;
- helped people withstand the wartime winter by providing fuel, cash assistance, and organising temporary shelters for internally displaced persons (IDPs)).

Priorities for 2025:

In 2025, activities will focus on durable solutions for IDPs, including expanding social housing, overcoming critical challenges, and revitalising the agricultural sector in liberated areas.



Multipurpose Cash Assistance (MPCA)




PROGRAM ACTIVITIES — 2024

12,207 people received multipurpose financial aid for UAH 10,800 per person.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS IN 2024:

• We succeeded in providing MPCA to the most vulnerable and socially disadvantaged members of communities in the most remote and frontline areas (0-50 km). Among them:



This was possible thanks to remote registration and cooperation with local authorities, volunteers, and activists.

- We introduced a tool for assessing household vulnerability and automated a social benefit calculator.
- Unified MPCA standards for the entire Caritas network.
- The Cash Working Group invited us to lead the MPCA cluster in recognition of our experience and professionalism in cash assistance.

Plans for 2025:

- Increase the program's presence in all frontline regions, as well as in Central and Western Ukraine.
- Introduce financial-literacy programs for communities. This will ensure the efficient use of resources, increase financial sustainability, and minimize the risks of misallocation of funds.

Vasyl Zhgun, Program Manager: «In 2024, the Program played a key role in supporting livelihoods and the local economy, promoted social cohesion, and proved its effectiveness and necessity. This is evidenced
by monitoring data and feedback from recipients in 2024: 89.1% of people believe that the MPCA best met their needs, 90.3% are satisfied with the registration process, 94.1% believe that this type of assistance was provided safely, and 97.4% received assistance on time.»





Since the beginning of 2024, 269,220 protection-related services have been provided:

52,010 people received counselling through twelve hotlines (hotlines serve as a referral for internal or external assistance)

7,572 people received case management services (needs assessment, first psychological aid, counselling, practical assistance: support, cash for protection, advocacy, internal and external referrals for legal assistance or other services) and crisis intervention:

- 9,831 people received crisis intervention services
- 883 people received cash grants for protection
- 5,470 people received legal support
- **667** people successfully defended their rights
- 33 state-funded Resilience Centres based on 20 local diocesan and parish Caritas organisations.

Key achievements in 2024:

- Crisis centres in 20 regions of Ukraine.
- Mobile teams in the frontline regions: Chernihiv, Sumy, Zaporizhzhia.
- Obtaining state funding for the provision of services by local organisations.
- 33 Resilience Centres at 20 local diocesan and parish Caritas organisations.
- Paralegal assistance.
- Developing proposals for a barrier-free strategy for 2025-26 for the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine

In 2025, the priority will be **digitising services**, attracting **state funding**, **and supporting** local organisations in opening **Resilience Centres**. The development of a network of paralegals, advocacy at the local level, and specialised support for veterans and their families will also be strengthened.

Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS)

- 18,313 people received psychosocial services
- 103,570 psychological services (individual and group work)

Key achievements in 2024:

- **Collaboration of program experts with specialists across the Caritas network** helped counteract staff burnout
- Support for families of military personnel and veterans

In 2025, Caritas will focus on multilevel psycho-education for beneficiaries and staff, including war-affected people, and the introduction new forms of **crisis support**.







- 13 inclusion centres provided services to 11,630 unique beneficiaries
- **89,217** services provided to people with disabilities and their caregivers
- 6,149 households used the services of inclusive spaces
- 279 people were trained to improve their skills in assisting people with disabilities and their families

Key achievements in 2024:

We expanded **access to humanitarian aid** for vulnerable groups and implemented an inclusive approach in all Caritas projects, integrating accessibility standards into humanitarian and social initiatives. We also **launched a** <u>marketplace</u> to sell products made by people with disabilities.

In 2025, the company plans to record training videos, conduct an advocacy campaign promoting inclusion, and improve procedures and monitoring.



Since the beginning of 2024, 33,188 housing-related services have been provided, in particular:

- 5,288 people received assistance with housing repairs (cash grants, work with subcontractors).
- 1,251 households received emergency housing repair kits and materials.
- **1,320** people received a start-up grant and money for renting housing.
- 6,406 people received standard and non-standard non-food kits.
- **18,995** people received winterisation services (in particular, 12,294 people received winter energy, 752 people received heating devices, 4,719 people received money to pay for utilities, 873 people received non-food items for the winter, and 357 people received home insulation services).

Key achievements in 2024:

- Expanding program coverage to 17 regions.
- Formation of expert teams for humanitarian repairs, winterisation, rental housing, and collective centres.
- Involving case managers in project work for more comprehensive and effective humanitarian support.

Plans for 2025:

- **Repair** of homes, collective centres, and social infrastructure facilities damaged by Russian aggression.
- Preparing people for cold periods.
- Implementation of pilot projects providing long-term housing solutions for IDPs.

Iryna Noga, Program Manager: «Due to the Russian aggression, civilian homes are constantly being destroyed. Even if the active phase of hostilities ends, Ukrainians will still need help across the country, not only in the frontline regions. People will return home, including returnees from abroad, yet may have nowhere to live. Ukrainian cities and villages require extensive reconstruction. Therefore, as the State's partner in responding to the humanitarian crisis, Caritas Ukraine is already actively implementing and advocating housing solutions for internally displaced persons from the most vulnerable population groups.»



Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH)



Since the beginning of 2024, **156,033** services have been provided under the Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) program, including

- 59,519 units of non-food aid
- 58,533 people received emergency water-supply services (water distribution)
- **33,421** people received services for the restoration of facilities (installation of water-filtration units in institutions)
- **7,726** people received services to repair existing decentralised water-supply systems.

We continue to implement a comprehensive Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) assistance program, prioritising systemic solutions that restore access to water. These will positively impact the lives of communities in need and those most affected by the war in **Kyiv**, **Kharkiv**, **Kherson**, **Mykolaiv**, **Zaporizhzhia**, **Donetsk**, **and Dnipropetrovsk** oblasts.



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Key achievements in 2024:

- **Restoring 38 wells and installing 54 filtering stations** in Kharkiv, Donetsk, Zaporizhzhia, and Dnipro regions, providing clean drinking water to more than **110,000 people.**
- Distribution of water to the affected communities.
- **Distribution of hygiene kits**, particularly in the frontline areas.
- Improving sanitary and hygienic conditions in socially significant institutions, including repairs and equipping of toilets, showers, and bathrooms in boarding schools, hospitals, outpatient clinics, and other institutions serving vulnerable populations.

We also implemented the following innovative and creative solutions:

- **Digitalisation of program-activity monitoring,** including development of a dashboard to track progress and systematise data.
- Real-time monitoring of filtering stations.
- Developing new solutions for evacuees, including specialised hygiene kits for people in transit.
- Development of a children's book «Does Water Have a Heart?» as part of educational activities

In 2025, the priority will be to **restore water-supply sources**, develop **sewage systems**, and improve sanitary and hygienic conditions in communities and institutions. Basic hygiene will also be provided to vulnerable groups, and an awareness campaign on water conservation will be conducted.



facilities, including vital water-supply systems. Now, they are being actively restored, including with the support of Caritas Ukraine. In the meantime, Caritas Mykolaiv is trying to provide people with as much quality drinking water as possible by delivering it to the affected communities in the region.



Food Security and Quick Response (FSQR)



- 444,768 food-related services delivered (general food distributions and hot meals).
- 532,879 metric tonnes of additional institutional food distributed.

Key achievements in 2024:

- Introduced transit food packages for evacuees.
- **Optimised the provision of hot meals,** particularly by moving mobile kitchens closer to evacuation sites and providing meals at transit points.
- Updated the rapid crisis-response protocol to allow for the involvement of local organisations outside the network and local authorities, which can provide a stronger Caritas response in places with limited access.

Plans for 2025

In 2025, we plan to open **social canteens** and introduce **new food-assistance modalities**, including a **"Cash for Food"** mechanism, to ensure stable support for the victims. Emphasis will also be placed on strengthening **humanitarian-response coordination** through cooperation with national and international partners.







Since the beginning of 2024, **294,964** people have contacted the Safe Migration and Combating Human Trafficking Program, including:

- **903** people received reintegration and counselling services. 198 of them were identified as victims of human trafficking.
- **321** outreach events held and 18,832 leaflets and promotional materials distributed.

Key achievements in 2024:

- **Strengthened cooperation** between Caritas Ukraine and the Ministry of Internal Affairs, the National Police, the Prosecutor's Office, the Ministry of Social Policy, the National Social Service, as well as the Ombudsman's Office.
- Implemented projects aimed at assisting vulnerable victims of human trafficking in Ukraine.
- **Expanded the network of Anti-Trafficking Centres:** up to 7 local organisations now delivering program activities in 12 oblasts of Ukraine.
- Identified 198 victims of human trafficking and 120 potential victims, providing comprehensive reintegration assistance.
- Conduct **311 events to raise public awareness** of human trafficking.

- Engaged 300,000 people in preventive and informational activities.
- Launched an online course on the Prometheus learning platform, «Human Trafficking: How to Protect Yourself and Your Loved Ones», which **23,668** students completed in six months.

In 2025, the Program will focus on **expanding the network** of Anti-Trafficking Centres, deepening cooperation with **neighbouring Caritas organisations**, and supporting vulnerable groups returning from abroad.



Iryna Maievska, Program Manager: «The war directly affects migration processes both within and beyond Ukraine. No society was prepared for the challenges Ukrainians now face. Forced migration entails many security risks less visible than shelling or explosions. Our Program works to mitigate these risks, supporting people at the decision to move, along their journey, and upon their return home.»







Since the beginning of 2024, 4,885 livelihood services have been delivered, including:

- **1,591** Cash-for-Work and Cash-for-Job grants
- 237 business grants
- 1,081 agricultural grants

In addition,

• 1,976 people took part in training sessions or received mentoring support.

Key achievements in 2024:

• **Combining business and employment support:** financial support for job creation and sustainable formal employment.

Results:

- 1,425 people engaged in socially useful work
- **158** people obtained employment

The ELIS pilot project was the breakthrough of the year

The project tested various support models for businesses, services, agriculture, and employment.

Results:

- Collected and systematised best practices
- **139** business grants awarded, including 38 grants under ELIS Odesa

Support for the agricultural sector

- Created the «AgroGuide» a practical handbook for farmers and orchardists,
- Handed out **1,081** grants to small farms and farmers

The key result: families secured their own food, while small agricultural enterprises scaled production, created new jobs and developed local markets.

In 2025, the priorities will be to develop reskilling programs and expand agricultural initiatives, focusing on small farms and innovation. It is also planned to intensify cooperation with the private sector to create new employment and business-development opportunities.

Vasyl Mikula, Program Manager: «Local change — global impact». We aim to invest resources efficiently to ensure sustainable impact and long-term results. The effectiveness of our actions is the responsibility of every team member. People's lives depend on how well we plan, implement, and monitor the program. And it's not just statistics — it's real human lives and the transformation of entire communities. We strive to build the foundation for the future by nurturing entrepreneurship, creating jobs, supporting local economies, and introducing innovations. Moving from basic financial assistance to comprehensive solutions is the pathway to Ukraine's sustainable recovery and improving people's life prospects.»







In 2024, Caritas Ukraine provided more than **143,000** educational and psychosocial services to children, parents, and teachers.

Key achievements in 2024:

- 26,152 children attended 46 children's spaces and centres.
- **12,437 activities** conducted on emotional learning, psychological first aid, and mental health.
- 9,419 developmental classes and lessons conducted to make up for educational losses.
- 7,664 children rested at camps in Ukraine and abroad.
- 4,524 school kits distributed as part of the School Bag campaign.
- **3,949 parents** were trained in parenting skills and stress management.
- 2,275 children joined the psychosocial support program.
- **1,520 teachers** received professional support.
- 416 IDP children in shelters were involved in leisure and education.

Strategic steps:

- Provided access to safe spaces for children in all regions of Ukraine
- 51 Child Friendly Spaces opened within the network of 46 local Caritas organisations.
- Provided support to vulnerable groups, including families of soldiers and missing persons.

Plans for 2025

We will focus on the **sustainable operation of the Child Friendly Spaces** in all regions and the implementation of **a cross-cutting approach** focusing on professional assistance to children and families.

Zoryana Lukavetska, Program Manager: «War has a devastating impact on children — on their psychoemotional state, health, and development. That is why there is an urgent need to invest resources in children during the war. We focus on creating a safe, caring, inclusive, and supportive environment that helps children recover. Individualised approach, positive activities, and peer support are the key to overcoming the consequences of stressful events.»





In 2024, Caritas Ukraine provided **668,028** services to beneficiaries, their relatives, social workers, and volunteers under the Healthcare Program.

13,796 people received direct support, and **398** volunteers were involved in providing social and medical services.

Services provided by area:

- **111,391** medical care in centres (primary, secondary, telemedicine, mental health support).
- 474,903 home care for people 65+, people with disabilities, and people in difficult life circumstances.
- **340** telemedicine consultations for beneficiaries of home care centres.
- 37,901 palliative care by mobile multidisciplinary teams.

- 5,755 rental of medical and rehabilitation equipment.
- 1,828 individual consultations on basic care for beneficiaries.
- **30,860** care consultations for relatives, guardians, social workers, and volunteers.
- **8,187** individual and group counselling to support mental health.

Key achievements in 2024:

- The Healthcare Program was the first among 13 Caritas programs to receive state funding from the NHSU (National Health Service of Ukraine) an important step towards the sustainability of beneficiary services.
- **A network of 10 medical centres** has been created, which operates in synergy with telemedicine, palliative care, and home care.
- 4 new medical centres opened, including the first inpatient hospice in the Caritas network.
- The Home Care area covers 22 organisations in 12 oblasts of Ukraine, with integrate
- Access to mental health services was expanded through the involvement of psychologists and psychotherapists and the launch of specialised support programs.

In 2025, it is planned to **stabilise and develop key areas by advocating for state funding for** home care services and mobile palliative care teams and by expanding the network of medical centres. Particular attention will be paid to **integrating telemedicine**, training specialists, and developing **rehabilitation services** for veterans.

Khrystyna Semehen-Bodak, Program Manager: «The program is moving towards sustainable development. We aim to make these services accessible and integrated into the state support system.»







Since the beginning of 2024, 20,548 services have been provided under the program, in particular:

- 2,374 volunteers were involved, including 1,400 active volunteers
- **100** parishes were involved in the development of social ministry
- 6,564 people participated in 795 facilitated community events

Key achievements in 2024

- 400 Caritas volunteers from 30 local organisations took part in the Third Volunteer Pilgrimage 2024 as part of the Spiritual Formation of Volunteers project.
- Launched systemic assistance to veterans, their families, and families of the fallen. In particular, two projects were implemented through which more than 600 relatives of the deceased and veteran families received psychological and spiritual assistance and became better integrated into their communities.

In 2025, the program will focus on holding integration events and dialogues in communities, enhancing volunteer management, supporting professional and youth volunteering, and strengthening the role of local Caritas branches.

Hanna Homeniuk, Program Manager: «The Social Cohesion Program strengthens its projects by activating communities and volunteering, and implements initiatives aimed at stabilising society during the war."







In 2024, 42,638 people and 36,349 households benefited from the project.

The project provided humanitarian aid to the most war-affected and needy regions and vulnerable population groups, including Kherson, Zaporizhzhia, Donetsk, Kharkiv, and Sumy oblasts. In particular, children, persons with disabilities, large households, older people, and internally displaced persons received humanitarian assistance covering basic needs and psychosocial support.

Key achievements in 2024:

Access to food assistance:

- 4,504 people received hot meals
- 7,997 people received basic food aid
- 224 people received financial assistance for work

Access to safe water and hygiene care

- 6,430 people received bottled drinking water, and 3,300 people received water from water tankers
- **11,299** people received basic hygiene assistance

Access to temporary shelter and safe housing

- 12,000 people were assisted in transit/reception centres and collective centres.
- 10 playgrounds were equipped to serve children in a safe environment.

- 1,455 people received necessities.
- **1,173** households received emergency housing-repair kits and materials.
- **6** households received assistance for minor repairs.
- **1,087** households received fuel assistance.
- 232 households received heating devices.
- 1 transit centre in Pavlohrad was equipped with backup power sources.
- 23 households received cash grants to rent safe accommodation for three months.

Access to social protection and educational support services

- 3,450 people received assistance in crisis centres.
- **1,763** children of different age groups attending pre-school institutions used the services of mobile assistance groups.

Access to legal aid

- **793** people received individual consultations, and **260** beneficiaries received group consultations from lawyers and advocacy specialists.
- **1,088** legal-aid and representation services were delivered during the project year.

Access to the necessary training resources for Caritas staff to improve the quality of services provided

- 560 capacity-building and professional development events were held for employees.
- 95% of employees improved their skills in delivering humanitarian aid.
- EUR 617,637.67 raised by local organisations for humanitarian goods and services.

Where recovery is a shared endeavour

In 2024, the Caritas Volyn team implemented powerful, comprehensive support programs for children, youth, people from vulnerable groups, and those who returned from the occupation. The projects implemented include Home Care, Supported Living, five Resilience Centres, and a new initiative — a gym in a shelter, which has become a place of strength for veterans and schoolchildren. Through sports, socialising, and mutual support, bonds are built daily to keep morale high.

«The words of the children from the camp are something that touches you to tears. They say we don't want to go back because there is shelling at home. And here there is peace, friends, games, life. We will expand our Resilience Centres and develop the work of the "Parasolka" camp so that safe places like these become more numerous» — Fr. Volodymyr Kmet, Head of Caritas Volyn

In 2025, the organisation will focus on expanding the network of Resilience Centres, creating a social laundry, supporting children and veterans, and fostering self-reliance through social entrepreneurship.

An apartment that has become a refuge for hundreds

In 2024, the Caritas Poltava team continued to support IDPs, work with veterans, families in crisis, children, and people with disabilities. We launched several new areas: «Green Fortress» to create ecological spaces, «Warm Hugs» to support children aged 3-6, and mobile legal-aid teams in rural villages. These initiatives have strengthened communities and made assistance more accessible. And it all started modestly — with a two-room apartment.

«Once a woman who came to our centre after evacuation with her sick mother asked for shoes — she was wearing rubber slippers in the middle of winter. We didn't have her size. And our employee simply gave her shoes. This is how the strongest decisions are born — out of empathy.» — Fr. Volodymyr Rakovetskyi, Head of Caritas Poltava

In 2025, the foundation will focus on developing a social enterprise and realising a dream: creating a space for young people — the House of Creativity, where a psychologist and a confessor will be next to the microphone. We want young talents to grow in an inspiring community, not on the streets.

In 2025, the organisation will continue to implement the Emergency Appeal and develop support that helps people survive and find a new beginning.










